STAMFORD — Fifteen members of the clergy will gather at 7 tonight at the First United Methodist Church to lead a World AIDS Day service of remembrance, awareness, hope and healing for people whose lives have been touched by AIDS.

The service, sponsored by AIDS Interfaith Stamford, brings together Protestant, Catholic, Jewish and Greek Orthodox clergy.

"In the 22nd year of the AIDS pandemic, we're coming together to raise up the plight of those infected, and join together to comfort them as well as their families, friends an caregivers," said the Rev. Dr. Douglas McArthur, pastor of First United Methodist Church and chairman of AIDS Interfaith in Stamford. "We will remember those lost and hear from those living with this disease. We will pray together and commit ourselves to doing all humanly possible to improve and save lives."

The project is primarily a volunteer-based effort. Town and block captains from each community sell luminary kits and deliver order forms to households on their streets. Dozens of other volunteers also help assemble luminary kits, and distribute them as the lighting date nears.

Last year, more than 600 volunteers helped sell over 7,500 luminary kits.

A rain date is scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 17.

'Hope Lights Lives" luminary kits are \$25 and contain 12 tea light candles, 12 white paper bags and 12 plastic candle holders.

Aquarium to offer winter cruises on Sound to view seals and birds

NORWALK — If you like seeing the harbor seals at The Maritime Aquarium, you'll love seeing seals in the wild on one of the Aquarium's Winter Creature Cruises. Cruise with Aquarium edu-

cators aboard the research vessel Oceanic on a two-and-a halfhour adventure into Norwalk Harbor and Long Island Sound in hopes of spying some of the growing numbers of seals and birds that winter here.

Participants will observe science in action and have a great experience at the same

The seals can often be observed at low tide, when they "haul out" to rest on exposed rocks. Aquarium educators will also point out winter waterfowl, discuss the formation of Long Island Sound, and talk about the changes that occur in the Sound over the Weather and animal sight-

ing data collected during each cruise is added to the Aquarium's Harbor Seal Census and Biodiversity Study Census databases. Cruises continue on select

weekends through early April.
